

Life RestoRED

recreates meadows and pastures

Over the last hundred years, large areas of meadows and pastures have been abandoned as agriculture has been modernized and changed. However, many threatened animals and plants are still dependent on the cultivated and grazed areas as their habitat.

Heaths, hay meadows, wooded pastures, forest pastures, coastal meadows, alkaline fens, and semi-natural grasslands are habitats in the agricultural landscape that are listed in the EU Habitats Directive and that are of interest to preserve, to maintain the biodiversity in the EU.

The Life RestoRED project restores and creates better conditions for the survival of these habitats in the long term. This is for example done by disseminating knowledge and experiences.

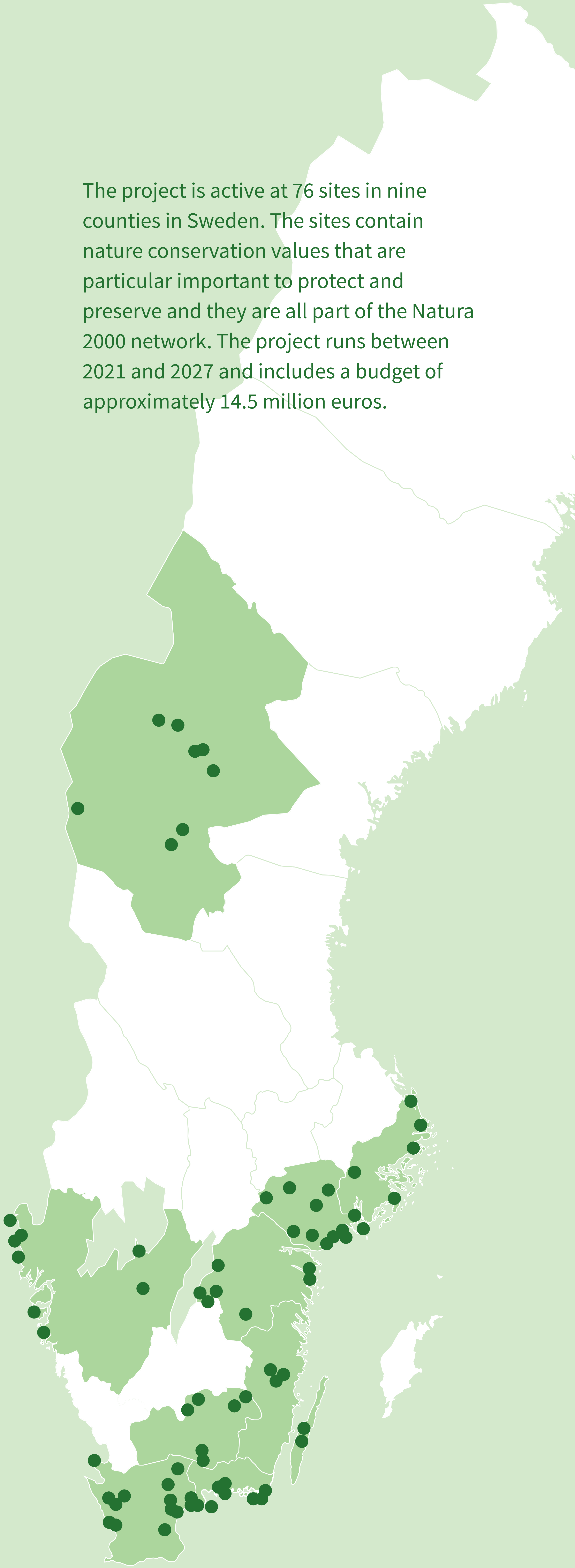


EXAMPLES OF NATURE CONSERVATION MEASURES

- Clearing of overgrown vegetation
- Fencing and reintroducing grazing and mowing
- Management of trees and bushes
- Prescribed burning
- Tuft and stump removal
- Restore hydrology in alkaline fens
- Create conditions for wild pollinators



The project is active at 76 sites in nine counties in Sweden. The sites contain nature conservation values that are particularly important to protect and preserve and they are all part of the Natura 2000 network. The project runs between 2021 and 2027 and includes a budget of approximately 14.5 million euros.
